The academic progress of all students undergoes continuous and systematic monitoring through a combination of oral and written assessments. These assessments encompass periodic examinations as well as internal assessment tests administered by the university twice per semester. To ensure meticulous oversight of student performance, each teacher is assigned a group of 15 to 20 students for monitoring and mentorship purposes. Counseling constitutes an integral component of the student mentoring process, wherein teachers engage with students facing academic or personal challenges. Such students receive guidance from senior and experienced mentors, who endeavor to alleviate concerns and uncertainties and provide necessary support to foster academic growth and personal development. Remedial classes were also arranged to help the weaker students in academic area.

The Academic Calendar for each year (Semester for LLB and MsC Maths) is disseminated by the Affiliating University prior to the onset of each academic term.
